
Our mission is to influence policy that fosters food security for all community members and promotes a healthy, equitable, and sustainable local food system with consideration for economic vitality and environmental impact.

HFDK Background

- Citizen-led ballot measure approved by 59% of Denver voters in November 2018
- Tax increase to establish a fund for healthy food access and foodbased education for Denver's youth
 - -0.08% general sales and use tax (certain categories that have special tax rates are not included in general sales and use, e.g. marijuana, food and beverage, auto rentals and fuel for aviation)
 - -Expected to generate ~\$11 million/year
 - -Term: January 1, 2019-December 31, 2028
- Funds distributed through grants to Denver non-profits, schools/DPS, and local government agencies
- Aimed primarily at low-income and at-risk youth



- Year-round access to healthy food, meals and snacks
- Hands-on education about farming, gardening, cooking, nutrition and healthy eating
- Preferential procurement of food from Colorado farms, ranches, and food manufacturers (up to 10%)
- Funds & organizations must principally benefit Denver and its residents
- No more than 10% for city administration costs














Overview of 2020 Projects

- Food access:
 - School food pantries, snack programs, no cost grocery distribution
- Food education:
 - Food justice curriculum, cooking classes, and building and teaching in school gardens greenhouses, and hydroponic classrooms

COVID-19 Emergency Hunger Relief Grants

- In March 2020, the HFDK Commission approved \$1.11 million dollars, including \$135k to DPS, to support emergency hunger relief needs, including in partnership with the Colorado Blueprint to End Hunger
- Funds awarded to feed youth in Denver during the pandemic, supporting food procurement, distribution, PPE, sanitation supplies, payroll, and communications
- Grantees are located across Denver, including in communities of color and areas of high poverty and food insecurity




Emergency Hunger Relief Grants:Who was served?



- Adaptive, participatory, culturally-responsive and equitable approaches
- Deliverables:
 - Baseline Assessment
 - Social Network/Systems Map
 - Theory of Change
 - Macro-Evaluation Plan
 - Grantee/cohort-level indicators and quarterly dashboards

HFDK Projected Revenue






Budget Update

A note about the revenue: 2019 revenues were slightly higher than originally expected. 2020 revenues are expected to decrease by about (-)8% and 2021 revenues are expected to slowly rebound back by about (+)9% (so getting back to prepandemic levels by the end of 2021).
